While weather-wear and vandalism accounts for most of the destruction of individual tombstones, neglect is directly responsible for the eventual deterioration of graveyards. Several local cemeteries have had no protective fencing for a number of years and the grounds have become grazing land for livestock. Groundhogs and other burrowing animals have undermined large portions of various cemeteries. Some areas are nearly invisible because of massive growths of weeds and brush. In some cases, the stones have fallen, broken, and become completely buried in debris.

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## Preface

Within the boundaries of McDonough County, Illinois are more than a hundred cemeteries and gravesites ranging in size from a single burial site to the expansive Oakwood Cemetery at Macomb. Within these cemeteries are the remains of an estimated 40,000 individuals who have died since the first settler arrived here over 150 years ago. Graves of countless others are scattered over the countryside of McDonough County; but, exact sites of many of these resting places are no longer known for various reasons. During the early days of this county, there were obviously no central burial grounds; thus, a pioneer family having the misfortune of losing one of its members placed the deceased in a grave on a family homestead and erected a makeshift marker. A number of these family burial grounds later became public cemeteries, however, many of the grave sites soon became "lost". Crude wooden markers or a hand engraved stone soon succumbed to the elements and were never replaced; scores of families moved further west after staying in this area only a short time and the gravesites of their loved ones shortly became insignificant mounds of earth; a number of families passing through this vicinity suffered individual losses. A prime example of the latter is contained in a history of Bethel Township. In 1830, four children of an emigrant family died while enroute through McDonough County. They were buried near their places of death which occurred about two miles southwest of Fandon. All traces of those graves have long been gone. During the summer of 1834, a widow lady died at her home in northern Tennessee Township. Her coffin of dressed walnut lumber was built by a local cabinet maker and she was buried in the timber near her home. Within a few years, no evidence remained to indicate the presence of her final resting place. A family who created an excellent farm from the prairies a few miles north of Macomb, maintained a fenced family burial site for several years. This cemetery contained the graves of about 12 former family members. During the early 1900's, the farm changed ownership. Shortly thereafter, the new owner removed all the stones, took down the fence, and this graveyard became part of a cornfield. These are only three of the countless incidents involving the total disappearance of burial sites. At this time, it is impossible to determine the locations of hundreds of individual's graves in this county.

Stones have fallen, broken, and become completely covered with soil and debris.

The overall conditions of our county cemeteries is a pathetic case. While some grounds are well maintained, or at least partially kept-up by various families, many have been totally forgotten. This situation is appalling and should never have come about. Apparently, lack of time, expense, and most of all regard has brought about the present-day poor conditions of many of our rural cemeteries.

Genealogical notes accompanying the various cemetery listings were prepared from a wide variety of sources including: Local area history books and atlases; newspaper files; county, state, and federal archives; family histories. These notes were collected at random from readily available sources and little, or no attempts were made to search for material for more complete genealogies. These notes are presented only for the purposes of identification and/or clarification.

Every attempt has been made to present complete and accurate information. Readers will find errors and omissions. Others will not agree with portions of my findings; however, no information contained herein is based solely on assumption or guesswork. It must be remembered that this information has been prepared for use only as a tool for further research and that nothing must be taken as final and absolute.

The larger cemeteries contained in these volumes are accompanied by grave location charts. These charts in no way are intended to represent any professionally prepared plat or survey that may exist. Their preparation and presentation are solely for general location purposes.

When copying inscriptions from grave markers, it is sometimes impossible to read some portions of the engraving. Names, dates, ages, etc. that were found to be unclear or totally missing are indicated by the use of question marks or dashes, i.e., SPICER, James T., infant son of ?J.B. & S.J.?; d. -----; age -----. The letters or numbers enclosed in parenthesis following the inscription, indicate general location as indicated on the accompanying chart.

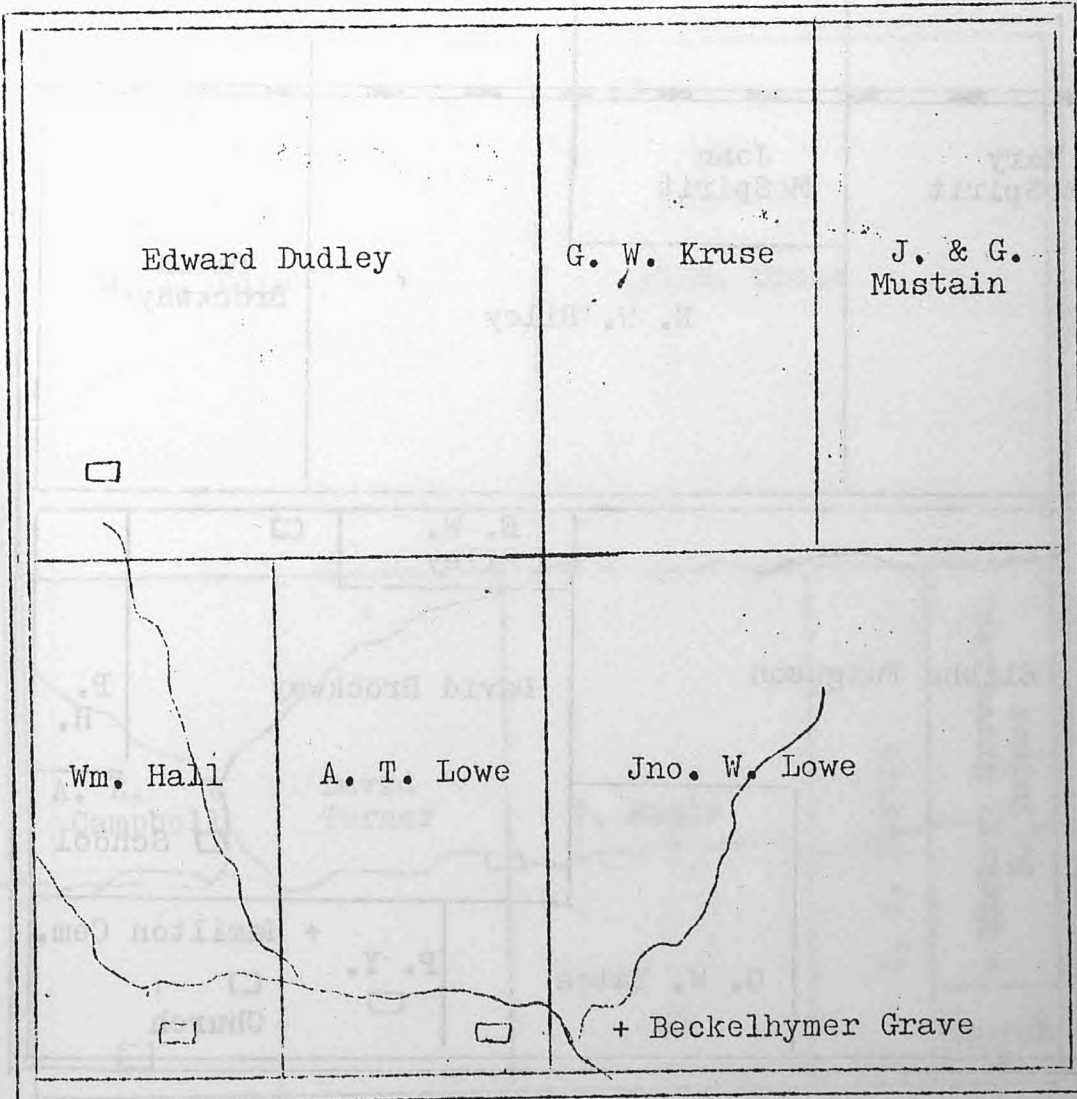

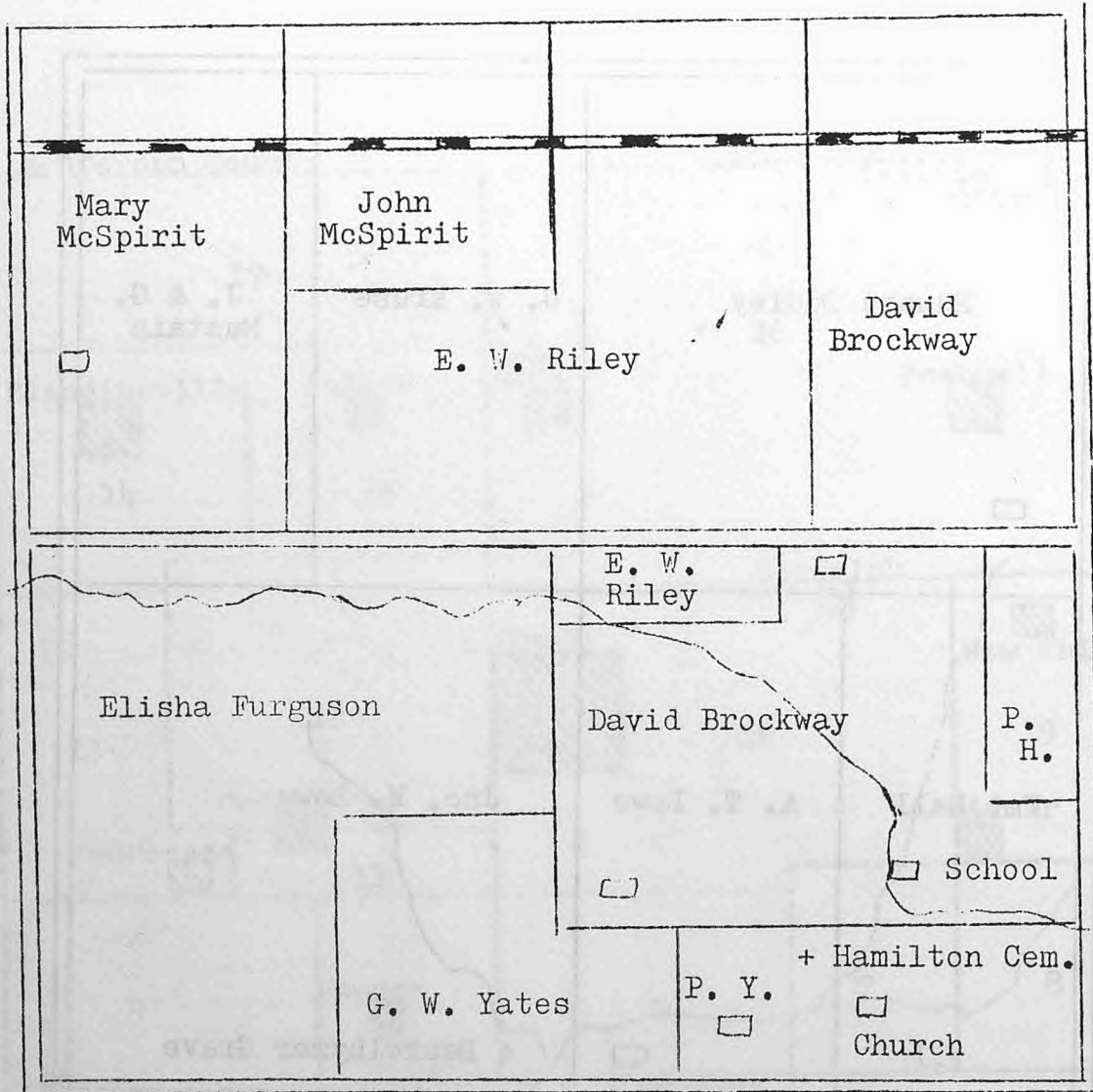
Section 15

Sciota Township, T7N R3W; 1871



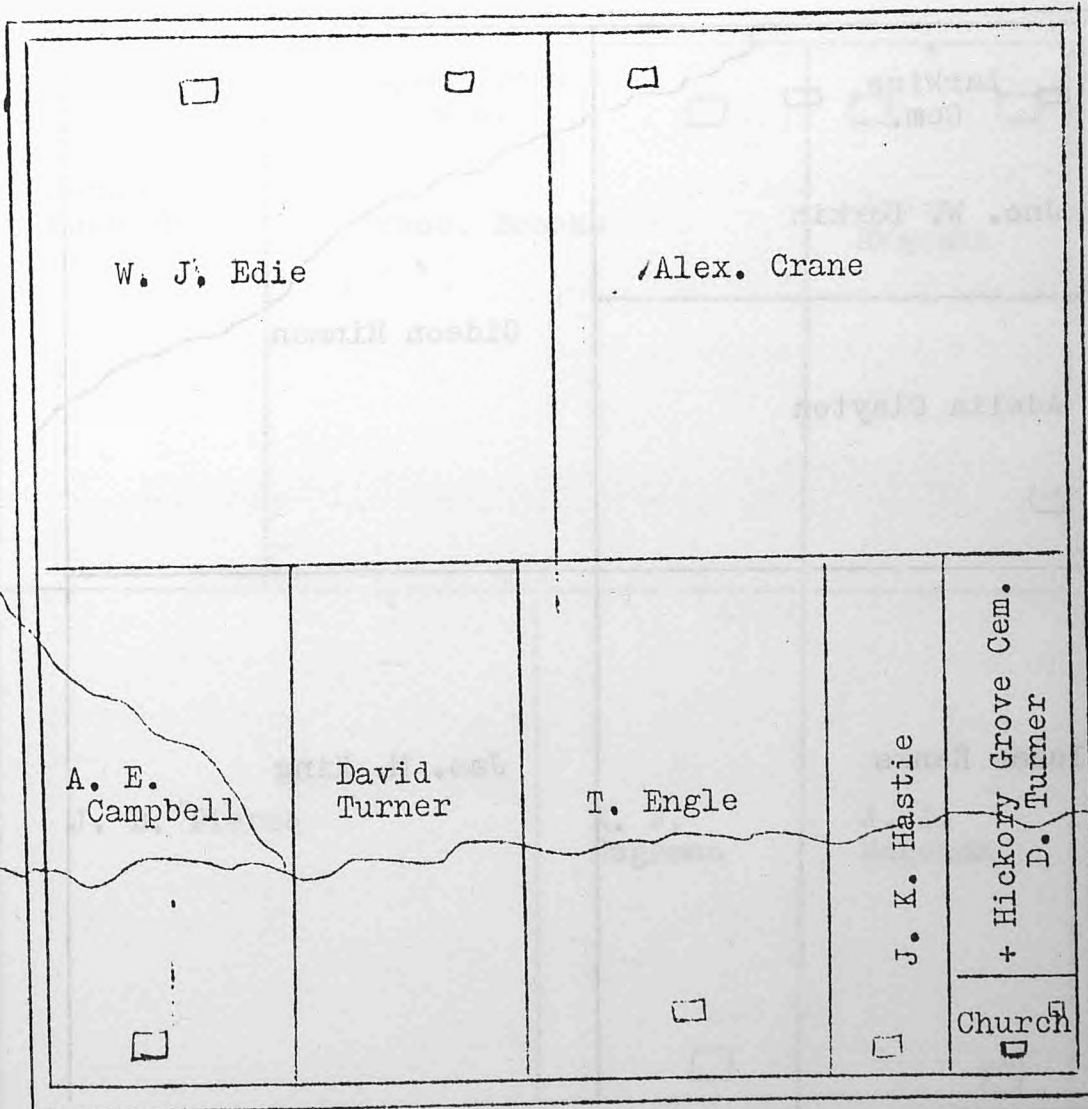
Section 32

Walnut Grove Township, T7N R2W; 1871



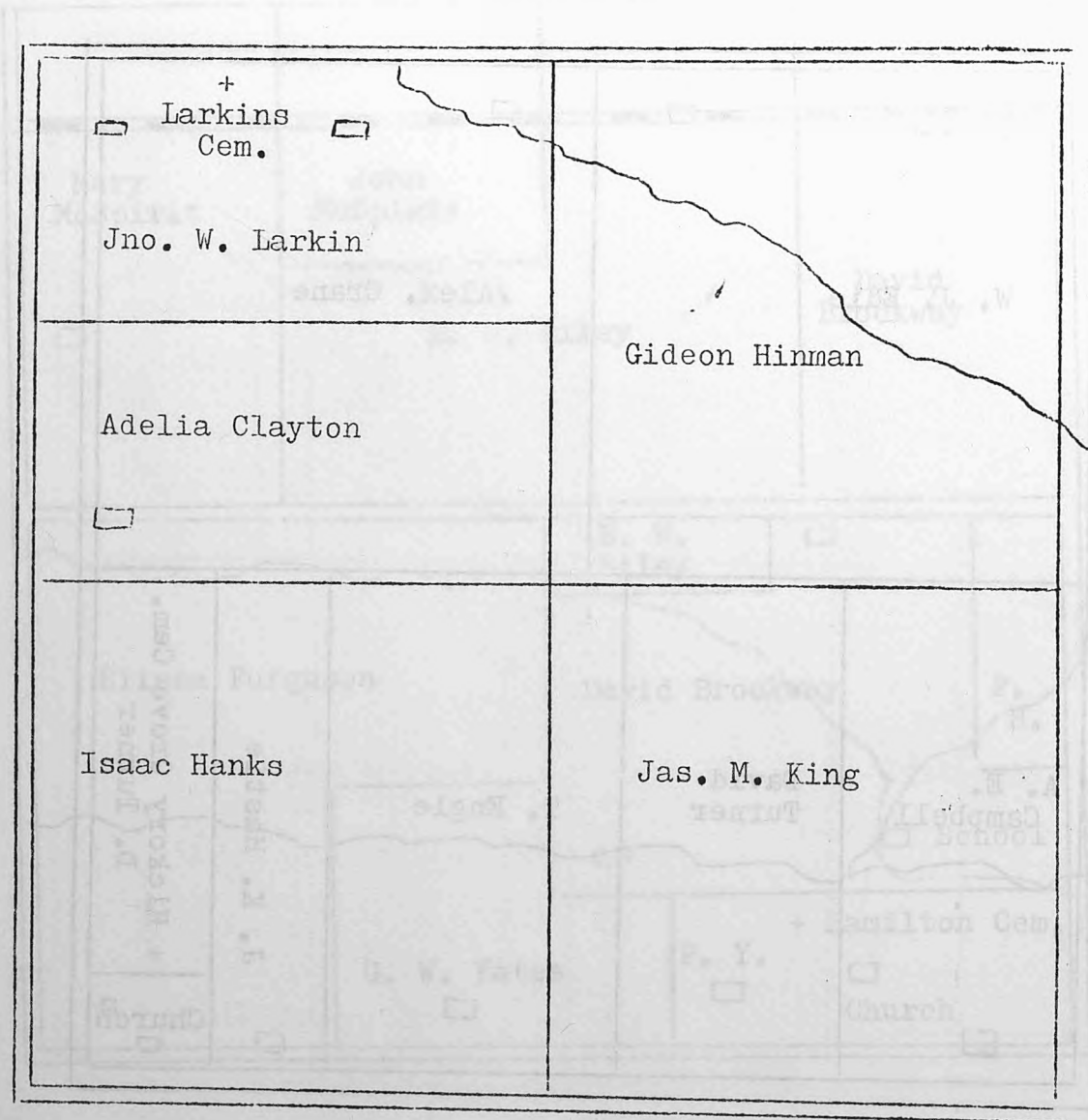

Walnut Grove Township, T7N R2W; 1871



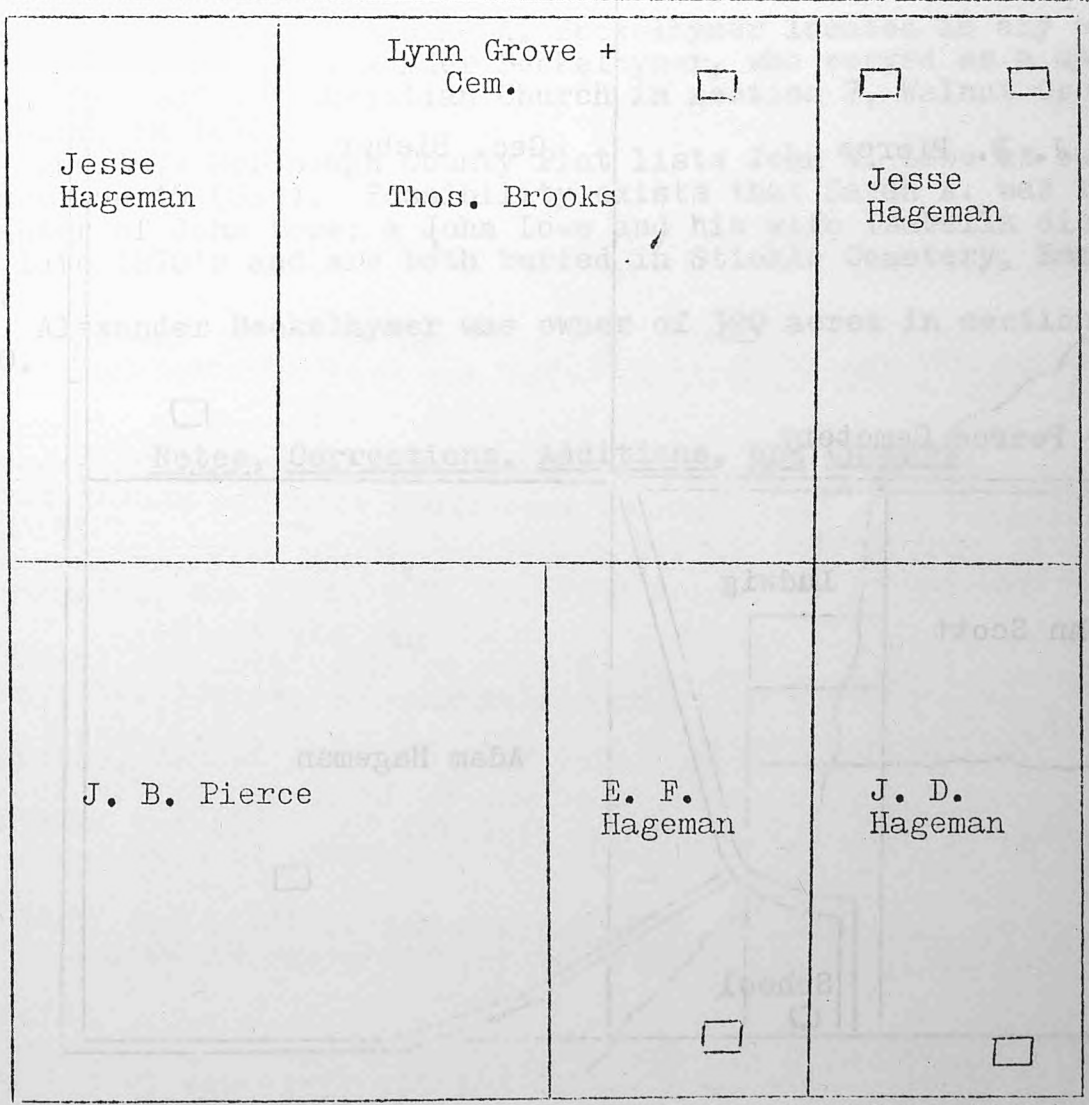

Walnut Grove Township, T7N R2W; 1871



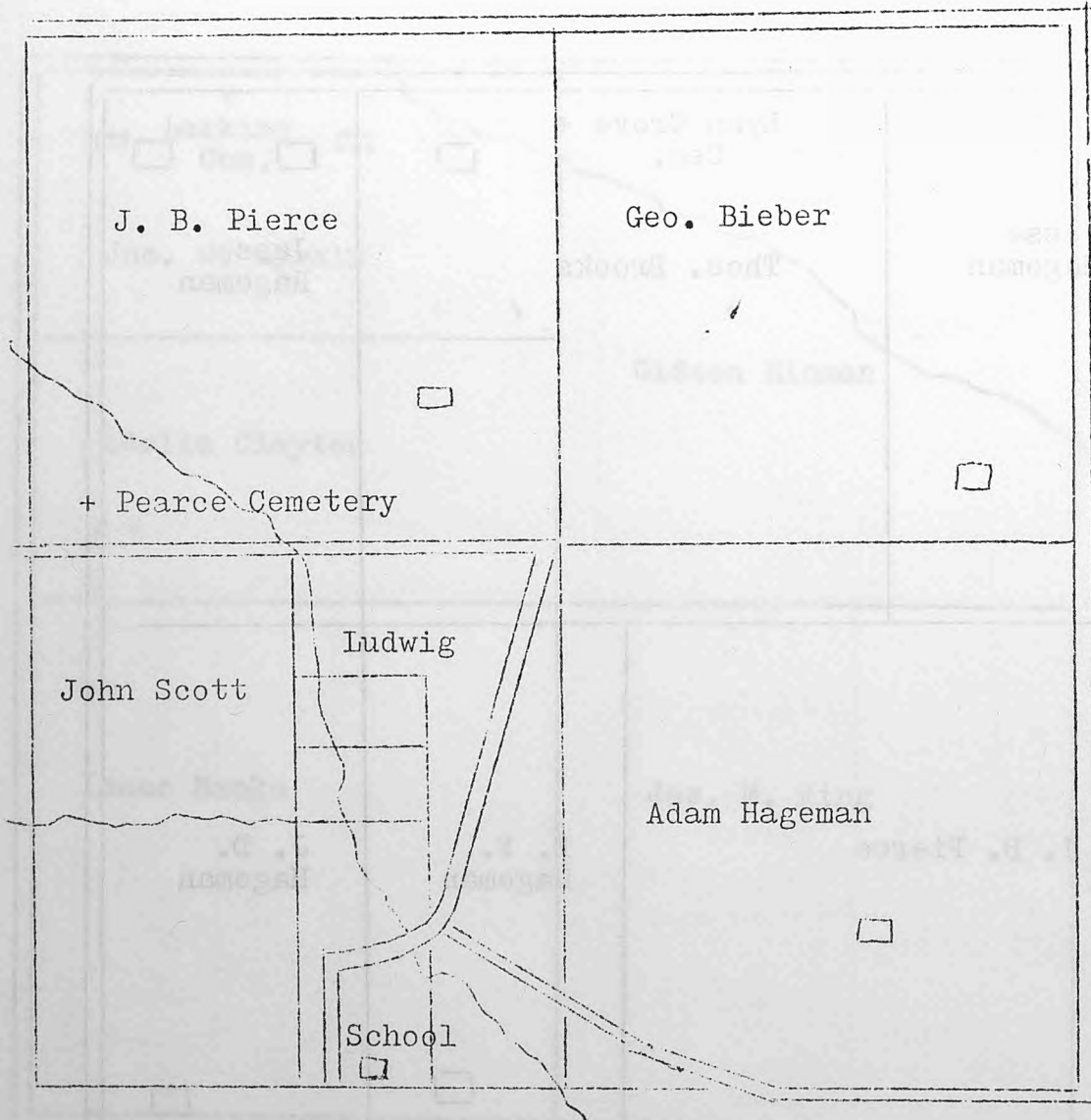
Section 23

## Beckelhymer Grave

A single gravestone is located in the SE $\frac{1}{4}$  of Section 15, Sciota township. The large white stone is overturned and broken in several pieces. The inscription reads:

BECKELHYMER, Sarah A., wife of A.; d. Feb 7, 1873; age 42y 4m 19d.

## Genealogical Notes

Only person by the name A. Beckelhymer located in any available references is Alexander Beckelhymer, who served as a deacon in the New Bedford Christian Church in section 7, Walnut Grove township, in 1876

The 1871 McDonough County Plat lists John W. Lowe as owner of section 15 (SE $\frac{1}{4}$ ). Possibility exists that Sarah A. was the daughter of John Lowe; a John Lowe and his wife Isabella died in the late 1870's and are both buried in Stickle Cemetery, Emmet Twp.

Alexander Beckelhymer was owner of 320 acres in section 11, 1870.

## Notes, Corrections, Additions, and Changes

## Hamilton Cemetery

Location: Walnut Grove Township, SE $\frac{1}{4}$ , Section 32, 2 miles southeast of Good Hope.

Remarks: Also known as Walnut Grove Cemetery, as the cemetery was established in conjunction with the Walnut Grove Cumberland Presbyterian Church, established in 1838, which stood near this location until about 1879. This grave registration was completed in mid-1973, and at that time the general condition of the cemetery grounds was extremely poor. There was no fencing and the area has been part of a pasture for a number of years. Stones are overturned, broken, misplaced, buried in several inches of sod, etc. Local area residents reported that a number of persons have been removed from this cemetery to other locations; however, the following list includes all those stones remaining at this location. Officially recorded removals are individually indicated.

Bennett were removed to the family lot at Oakwood in Macomb on Dec 1, 1887.

Genealogical Notes - Hamilton Cemetery

ALLISON: Louie I., dau of A. & L. Allison; died Apr 24, 1874.  
This was a daughter of Andrew and Lou Russell Allinson. Andrew was a son of William and Margaret Allison and was born in

ALLISON:

Augusta County, Va., Nov 16, 1837; he moved with his parents to Ohio in 1840 and to Tennessee Township, this county, in 1851; Andrew married Lou Russell, a daughter of T. A. Russell of Henderson County, Ill., on Dec 24, 1861; the Allisons farmed on section 36, Sciota Township several years and he also operated the Good Hope Creamery. Andrew and Lou had 4 children--William R. and Lawrence who both attended medical school, John R., and a daughter, Louie, who died at age 3; the Allisons also raised a niece, Jessie Paul. Andrew's father, William, died at age 74 at the home of Andrew & Lou.

BAKER: Charles J., and Sarah A. were children of Mr. & Mrs. Henry B. Baker who lived in the town of Good Hope. Henry was a member of the Village Board of Trustees in 1869 and was an officer in the Walnut Grove Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1878.

BENNETT: Albert C. was a son of Aaron & Rosella B. Fish Bennett. Aaron Bennett was born Dec 1, 1800 in New London, Conn; lived there till age 23; moved to Albany Co., NY; married a Miss Borrows on Mar 12, 1823 and had a son, Jefferson, who died in Albany Co. at age 26y. The family moved to Brooklyn, NY and Aaron was employed there in a fur factory; later moved to Staten Co., NY; farmed there about 17 years. Mrs. Bennett died in early 1838; Aaron re-married on Nov 5, 1838, to Rosella B. Fish. Mr. Bennett then bought his father-in-law's farm in Staten Co. In about 1855 the Bennet family moved to Des Moines Co., Iowa and shortly thereafter, moved to McDonough Co. and settled in Macomb Township, on the SW $\frac{1}{4}$  of section. Mr. Bennett owned 160A there. By Aaron's second marriage, there were 2 sons--Albert C. and Dayton.

BOOTH: Edward B., son of J. & E. Booth. (Mrs. Dunsworth and Edward Booth were buried side by side in the north-east portion of this cemetery and their graves are enclosed by a four foot woven wire fence topped by an iron railing. This is the only fenced area in the graveyard. A large tree is now growing from the center of this enclosure. Exact locations of these 2 graves were confirmed by the discovery of markers at the foot of each grave--"EBB" and "SED".)

BROOKING: This was the family of Edward S. Brooking, a son of Thomas A. Brooking, who lived in the Macomb area. Edward entered military service on Jun 5, 1864 and later died while a prisoner of war at Memphis, Tennessee. Other members of the Brooking family were buried at either Oakwood Cemetery in Macomb or in the family burial grounds on the homestead located in section 7, Macomb Township, about 3 miles north of Macomb.

CASTO: Alice and Harriette were daughters of Mr. & Mrs. Thomas J. Casto who lived in Macomb Township. Thomas was a son of Firman Casto who owned and operated a 160A farm in the southwest quarter of section 6, Macomb Township. Thomas had a

brother, John, and a sister, Rebecca, who both attended school at the Prairie Hill School in the 1860's. John later married a Miss Ratekin and moved to Nebraska where he subsequently became a State Representative. Thomas was a civil war veteran; he enlisted with Co "A", 84th Illinois Infantry on Aug 11, 1862 and was discharged on Feb 14, 1863.

**COLLINS:** J. Collins farmed on section 11, Macomb Township--about 4 miles southeast of Good Hope. He was a native of Ohio and moved to this county in 1857 from Adams County, Ill.

**CREEL:** Durham Creel and his family moved to this county from Adair County, Ky., in 1833 and settled a short distance northeast of the present site of Bardolph--on section 18, Mound Township. Durham was a native of Ky. and married Mary Smith of that State in about 1806. Durham and Mary had 10 children: Charles, Malinda, James, Martitia F., Cager, Silas J., Durham M., John, Sarah J., and Thomas J. John, Silas, and Durham were veterans of the Mormon War in 1844. Martitia married Alexander Harris and lived in Macomb Township. Durham M. served in the civil war as a surgeon and later became a physician in the village of Industry; he died in 1902 and was buried in Camp Creek Cemetery, northwest of Industry. Malinda married Levi Hamilton. Charles and Silas farmed about a mile south of Good Hope; several of Silas' children, including Cynthia and Linda, attended Prairie Hill School between Macomb and Good Hope in the early 1860's. A number of the Creel family were long-time members of the Walnut Grove Cumberland Presbyterian Church and Charles, Mary, and Parthena were original members when the church was organized in 1838. Charles, also a veteran of the Mormon War being commissioned a captain, was born in Ky., Aug 17, 1807; he married Parthena Bland in Ky. in 1833; then moved to this county in about 1836 and farmed in Mound and Emmet Townships; he owned 234A in Emmet Township; he and his wife raised 10 children; Parthena died Apr 17, 1882 and was buried at Walnut Grove Cemetery--Hamilton Cem. --later reinterred in Good Hope Cemetery. Silas J. was born in about 1818 and married in 1838; farmed a short time near Bardolph and later owned a farm on section 6, Macomb Township. Mrs. Mary (Smith) Creel died in 1873.

**DUNGAN:** Mary P. was a daughter of M. Bloomer and Milinda Creel Dungan. Mrs. Dungan was a daughter of Charles and Parthena Creel and was born in this county Dec 12, 1840. She and Mr. Dungan were married Nov 5, 1862 and had 6 children--2 daughters died in infancy and a son died in about 1887. Malinda Creel Dungan died on Apr 10, 1899 and was buried in the Good Hope Cemetery.

Several Dungan families lived and farmed in the Good Hope area during this period. D. J. Dungan, who lived about a  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile north of Good Hope was a local postmaster before the village of Good Hope was laid out in the 1860's. Thomas and Elisha Dungan were veterans of the Mormon War. Several Dungans are buried in the Good Hope Cemetery.

**FARGUSSON:** Children of Elisha and M. Isabel Duncan Fergusson who owned and operated a 200A farm in the north half of section 6, Macomb Township, for several years. Elisha was the son of Stephen & Nancy Fergusson and was born and raised in Adair Co., Ky. He was born Jan 29, 1814. Elisha moved to Illinois in about 1832 and farmed in the Bardolph area until 1843. He then moved to Galena and mined lead there for 7 years; then went to California and mined in that State for about 9 years; he then returned to this county and bought a farm about a mile south of Good Hope. He married Isabel Duncan on April 11, 1861. She was a daughter of William and Catherine Duncan who moved to this county in 1842 from Ky. Mr. Duncan died in 1860 and Mrs. Duncan then lived with the Fergussons for several years. The Fergussons had several children and 6 were living in 1885--William, Walter, Mary, Bertha, Arthur, and Ernest. Mr. Fergusson owned over 500A of farm land in this county in the late 1800's. Lot #25, in the Good Hope Cemetery was deeded to Elisha Fergusson in 1892. NOTE: The spelling of this family's surname was noted in various places as Fergusson, Farguson, Ferguson, and Furguson.

**HAMILTON:** Malinda K. and Mary M., were daughters of Silas H. and Francis B. Chapman Hamilton. Silas was a son of Levi and Malinda Creel Hamilton and was born in McDonough County on Jan 19, 1836. His father, Levi, was born in Adair County, Ky., in May, 1802. Levi's father was a native of Ireland and moved to this country with his parents and later bound out to pay his passage. He then served a total of 14 years under 2 different masters; got possession of his papers and ran away; returned to that area later and married there; then moved to Adair County Ky. Levi married at age 25 to Malinda Creel, a daughter of Durham Creel, also of Adair County. Two sons, Harrison and Uriah S., were born in Ky. The Hamilton family then moved to McDonough County and subsequently settled on Section 5, Macomb Township and lived there several years. Levi & Malinda Hamilton lived in this area until the spring of 1873 when they moved off the farm; in 1878 they relocated to Shenandoah, Iowa where their son, Uriah, was living. Malinda died in 1881 and Levi died in Mar 1882, both in Iowa. Silas H. married Frances B. Chapman, a daughter of S. N. Chapman of Nauvoo, Illinois, on Feb 28, 1856. The Chapmans had formerly lived in the Bowling Green, Ky area. Silas attended local schools and Knox College in Galesburg. He and his wife later moved to the city of Macomb and were in the mercantile business there for several years.

Harrison (d. 1867) was the eldest son of Levi and Malinda Creel Hamilton; he was born in Ky Aug 5, 1826 and moved with his parents to this county at about age 8 or 9 years. Harrison attended local schools and Creery Grove Academy near Abingdon, Ill.; on Jan 8, 1848, he married Rachel Ballance, a native of Lincolnshire, England and a daughter of Joseph and Ann Welborn Ballance. The Ballance family immigrated to this country in 1831 and were in Chester, Pa. for about 2 years. They then moved to this county and lived in Macomb a few months. Ballance then bought a farm, in 1837, on section 28, Walnut Grove Township. Joseph's brother, John Ballance, also settled in this area at that time

but he later moved with his family to Kansas. Joseph and Ann Ballance had 5 daughters: Rachel, the eldest, Mary, Hannah, Elizabeth, and Rebecca. Mrs. Ballance died Jul 28, 1848 and Joseph died on Jul 6, 1861. Both were reportedly buried in this cemetery, however, no trace of their stones or other markers was located. Harrison's wife, Rachel, had lived in the Hamilton household for about 7 years previous to their marriage in 1848. Mr. and Mrs. Harrison Hamilton had 7 children: Annie M., Albert W., Joseph F., William L., Ellis W., Mary J., and an infant who died in infancy. Albert and Mary also died at an early age. No stones nor markers for these 3 children were located in this cemetery. When Harrison died in 1867, he was survived by his widow and 4 children. Mrs. Hamilton continued to live on the farm for several years and the farm was later managed by her son, Ellis W.

Walton S., (d. 1864) was a son of Uriah S. and Catharine Bridges Hamilton; U. S. was the 2nd son of Levi Hamilton and was born in Ky. Mr. & Mrs. Hamilton were the parents of 4 children and later moved to Galesburg, Ill. thence to Shenandoah, Iowa.

James A., (d. 1863) was a son of William and Lucy Cannon Hamilton. William was a native of the State Virginia and moved to this county in 1836 from Indiana; the Hamiltons farmed on section 2, Macomb Township until 1864 when they moved to the city of Bushnell and opened a Grocery Store. He was listed in 1871 as owner of the south half (320A) of section 2, Macomb Township. William married Lucy Cannon of Macomb on Oct 29, 1839 and subsequently had 6 children---James A. was the first death in this family. Hamilton bought his 320A farm in February 1837 and lived there till 1864. William and Lucy Hamilton joined the Walnut Grove Cumberland Presbyterian Church in 1838. William was a private during the "Mormon War".

HARRIS: Henry H. (d. 1864) was a son of Alexander (d. 1862) Harris. Alexander Harris moved to this county from Sangamon County, Ill. in 1831 and settled on section 22, Macomb Township, about 4 miles northeast of Macomb. He was married in Adair County, Ky. to Martitia F. Creel, a daughter of Durham Creel. They moved to Illinois in 1830 and lived near Springfield for about a year; had 1 child while living there. A daughter, Parthena, was born Apr 1, 1835. Alexander's brother, Samuel, also lived in this part of McDonough County and was the first known death in the neighborhood in the early 1830's. Mr. Harris farmed on his original homestead until his death in 1862. The Harris family were among the original members of the Macomb Presbyterian Church which was organized in June 1832. Mr. and Mrs. Harris' son, Henry H., entered military service at Bushnell on May 11, 1864; this was a few days before his 16th birthday. Harris served as a private with Co "I", 137th Illinois Infantry. He died at Memphis, Tennessee on Sep 1, 1864. Ironically, the remainder of his unit was mustered out of service on Sep 4, 1864, just 3 days after his death.



HARTMAN: Rozette (d. 1873) was a daughter of Z. B. Hartman who farmed about 2 miles north of Good Hope in the 1860's and 1870's. His farm was located in section 18, Walnut Grove Township and contained 120A.

HAYNES: Members of a Haynes family are noted as being original members of the Walnut Grove Cumberland Presbyterian Church organized in 1838; they were Cyrus and Mahala Haynes.

HERING: C. O., son of J. M. & M. G. Hering; died Jul 31, 1878; age 11d. This was Clarence Oscar Herring--spelling of surname confirmed thru county death records--who died on the above date of cholera.

HOOPEs: Jonney W. (d. 1873) was a son of Mr. & Mrs. Lewis Hoopes who owned and farmed an 80A property in the northeast quarter of section 2, Emmet Township. Their home was located on the southeast corner of the quarter section.

MIELY: Abner Miely lived in this area in the mid-1800's and was married to Anna Crabb, a daughter of D. M. Crabb; the Miely's later moved to Blue Earth, Minn.

\*LONG: -----, (d. 1862) a daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Samuel C. Long who farmed in this area. Mr. Long was a veteran of the civil war and served as a private in Co "H" 119th Illinois Infantry; he entered service at Bushnell Aug 13, 1862.

RICKETTS: Zachariah (d. 1868). Mr. Ricketts farmed about a mile northwest of Good Hope and owned about 80A in the northwest quarter of section 25, Sciota Township. Ricketts and his family moved to Illinois in about 1854 from Indiana and bought the Sciota Township farm in 1856. He was a native of Ohio. His death was caused by a rattlesnake bite. Mary P. Ricketts was indicated as owner of the family farm in 1871.

TOWLER: Nancy (d. 1867). B. B. Towler farmed in Macomb Township; he was a native of Indiana and moved to this county from Adams County, Illinois in 1851.

WEBB: Margaret A., wife of H. B. Webb; died Nov 5, 1864. H. B. Webb and his family lived in Macomb Township for several years and farmed in the southwest quarter of section 9. He was also a director in Macomb Township District #4, Crabb School in the 1860's.

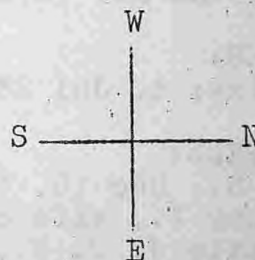
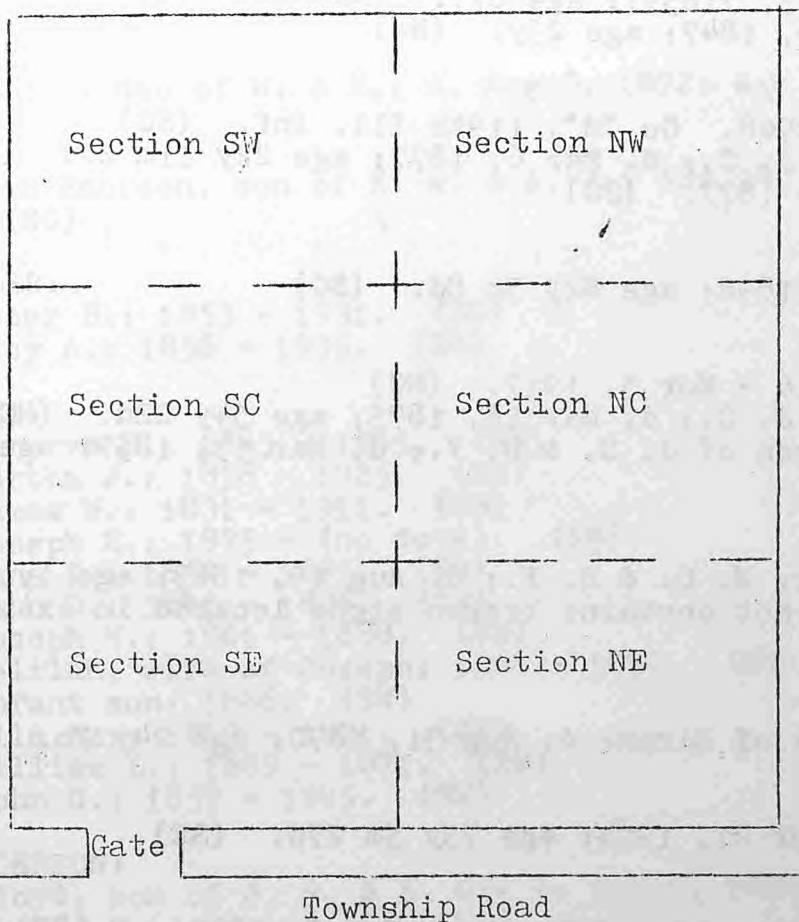

Virginia, Jan 24, 1829; raised there and worked with his father on the farm; graduated from Jefferson College, Pa in 1852 and taught school several months in Pa.; in 1853 moved to Vermont, Ill. and taught High School several terms; later taught at Lewistown and was elected county surveyor in Fulton Co.; moved to this county in 1865 and settled on a 240A farm in Walnut Grove Twp.; elected county surveyor in 1869; married Feb 24, 1858 to Sophia Irwin, daughter of Judge Irwin and had 5 children: Charlie, Irwin, Maggie E., Walter and Wm. J.; Mrs. Edie died Mar 30, 1866 and on Nov 28, 1870, Edie married Evaline Harris; he owned 440A in this county in 1885; also had 80A in Iowa.

Sophia A., was a daughter of James and Elizabeth Smith Irwin. They moved from Knox Co., Ohio to Vermont, Ill. in about 1850 and later to Eldorado Twp. in this county where they lived till their deaths. James Irwin and Elizabeth Smith were married in Mt. Vernon, Ohio on Aug 13, 1835; they had 3 children, including Sophia A. Mr. Irwin was elected to the office of county judge in 1873 and held the position for 4 years.

GRIGG: James W.; farmed on section 4, Walnut Grove township; native of Va.; moved here in 1855 from Cumberland, Ky.

Joseph W.; also farmed on section 4, Walnut Grove Township; native of Va; moved here in 1864 from Cumberland, Ky.  
(Probably father of James W.)

HOYT: Charles T.; farmed on section 9, Walnut Grove Township; moved to this county from Fulton Co. in 1858. Farm joined Dan Merry farm on the west.

KEISTER: H. Isabelle (Death notice, in part, from The Macomb Journal, Aug 23, 1883): "Mrs Hannah Keister, wife of Sam'l Keister of Walnut Grove, died on the 11th, aged 26 years."

LEMON: David (Court Records); died (date not shown) age 48y 11m 4d; died of TB; born in Hartley, S.C.; buried Hickory Grove Cemetery.

KINNEY: Elijah S. died Jan 10, 1917 and was buried in the west section of Prairie City Cemetery, #7, Lot 18, block 9. He served in the Union Army as a private in Co I, 11th Illinois Cavalry.

(NOTE: 11th Cav. mustered in to service on Dec 20, 1861 at Peoria---made up of men from the following counties: Peoria, Fulton, Tazewell, Woodford, Marshall, Stark, Knox, Henderson and Warren. Majority of troops discharged at Springfield on Oct 20, 1865.)

LARKINS: Joshua Larkins owned and operated the Eagle Mills, near the railroad depot in Prairie City during the mid 1800's. He was also a member of the Walnut Grove Township Board of Supervisors some time prior to 1877.

John (or Jonathan) W. Larkins owned 80 A. in NW $\frac{1}{4}$ , section 3, Walnut Grove twp; (old plat indicates 2 houses on this property; one immediately east of the cemetery and one about  $\frac{1}{4}$  mile west of the cemetery.

TRASEY: Warnel Tracy owned 175-180 acres in section 4, adjoining farm of J. W. Larkins.

Genealogical Notes - Lynn Grove Cemetery

BROOKS: Thomas (1842-1910); native of Ohio; here in 1863 from Fulton County, Ill.; owned 160A farm in section 23, Walnut Grove Twp. in 1871; property included cemetery grounds; was a vet. of Civil War.

FOX: Jane (d. 1882) (Death notice, in part, from The Macomb Journal, Feb 16, 1882): "Mrs. Jane Fox died at her home in Walnut Grove Twp. on Jan 20th; born in Ohio on July 18, 1831; she had been a resident of Illinois for 30 years. Member of the Linn Grove Methodist Church." Jane was the wife of B. F. Fox who owned 240A in sections 14 & 15, Walnut Grove Twp.; Mr. Fox was a native of the State of Virginia and moved to this county in 1864 from Henderson County, Illinois.

HAGEMAN: Martha A. (d. 1875) dau of Jesse D. and Sitha J. Thurman-Fruit Hageman. Note: This was neither of the 2 Jesse Hagemans noted below. Jesse D. Was the son of Isaac and Susan Lickey Hageman and was born in Wayne County, Ohio on Feb 5, 1839. In Nov 1839 the Hageman family moved to Cass County, Illinois and Jesse was raised in that county; parents both died there--father in Aug 1874 and mother in Sep 1885; Jesse D. was eldest of 8 children; moved to this county in 1861 onto a farm in the south-east quarter of section 23, Walnut Grove Twp.; this property had been purchased by his father, Isaac, about 3 years earlier. On Sep 4, 1862, Jesse married Sitha J. Fruit, widow of Alexander D. Fruit. She was a daughter of Bennett and Joyce Dunbar Thurman who settled in Prairie City Township in 1854 and later moved to Cherokee County, Kansas. Her father died in Kansas in Oct 1869; her mother later lived with another daughter, Elizabeth McClure. Sitha J. was the 2nd child in a family of 11 and was born in Madison County, Kentucky on Feb 13, 1841. Jesse and Sitha Hageman had 5 children--Emma A., Carrie C., Edward F., Martha A., and Oliver N. Mr Hageman owned about 160A in Walnut Grove Twp. and was the proud owner of an unusually large collection of books which he had collected over a period of many years.

Jesse (d. 1899) and Elizabeth (d. 1890) were the parents of William (d. 1929) Hageman.

HAGEMAN: Ida Alice, daughter of Jesse & Susan Hageman; the information on stone of Ida Alice Hageman indicating birth date as Jul 15, 1873; this is an obvious error; this date is most likely her date of death. Jesse Jr was a son of Jesse and Elizabeth Hageman and a brother of William M.

William M. Hageman was born in Wayne County, Ohio on June 27, 1834 and was a son of Jesse and Elizabeth Hageman; William was raised in Ohio and on Oct 16, 1856 was married to Sarah E. Jontz, a native of Wayne County, Ohio. The couple then moved to this county and began farming on the northwest quarter of section 24, Walnut Grove township. Thirty years after moving to Illinois, Mr. Hageman owned over 700A of farm land, which included 320A in the State of Kansas and a farm in Iowa. William and Sarah Hageman had 6 children--Henry J. married Francis Quigle and lived in this township; Harriet M. married John W. Zaring and moved to Washington County, Iowa; Minerva married Clinton Gossard and later lived on the family farm in this township; Mary E. married George W. Brewbaker and lived in this township; Charles Ezra and William Leander; another child died in infancy in Ohio on September 5, 1857.

LANTZ: David W. Lantz was born in Sussex County, New Jersey Oct 10 1816, and lived there till about age 30 years; on January 1, 1842, he was married to Malinda Heminover in his native State; 4 years later, in June 1846, he and his family moved west and settled in Fulton County, Illinois; they lived there about 12 years and then moved to this county and bought a farm in section 22, Walnut Grove Township; he and his wife lived at this location until their deaths. They had 8 children--Delphine who married Edward Dewey and moved to Farmer City, Illinois; Margaret married Emanuel Hageman and moved to near Leavenworth, Kansas; Watson married Lina Buck and lived in Walnut Grove Township; Mary married William Lofton; Martha married Alvin Berber and moved to Kansas; Selma and David Edward; another son Albert, who was born in 1847, died in infancy. Mr. Lantz owned a 160A farm, the northeast quarter of section 22.

Malinda (Death notice, in part, from The Macomb Journal, Feb 16, 1882): "Melinda, wife of David Lantz, died on the 6th, inst. at her home near Bushnell, age 64y 10m 3d. She leaves a husband and 7 children."

LEMON: George Lemon owned about 100A in the southeast quarter of section 2, Walnut Grove township.

LOFTON: Mary M. was a daughter of David W. and Malinda Heminover Lantz. She married William J. Lofton and they moved to Hancock County, Illinois. The family subsequently returned to this township and Willie W. was born here in December 1894. He died at age 1 month of pneumonia.

WALTERS: J. N. Walters owned 160A in section 11, Walnut Grove Township. He was born in Illinois and moved to this county in 1857 from Fulton County.

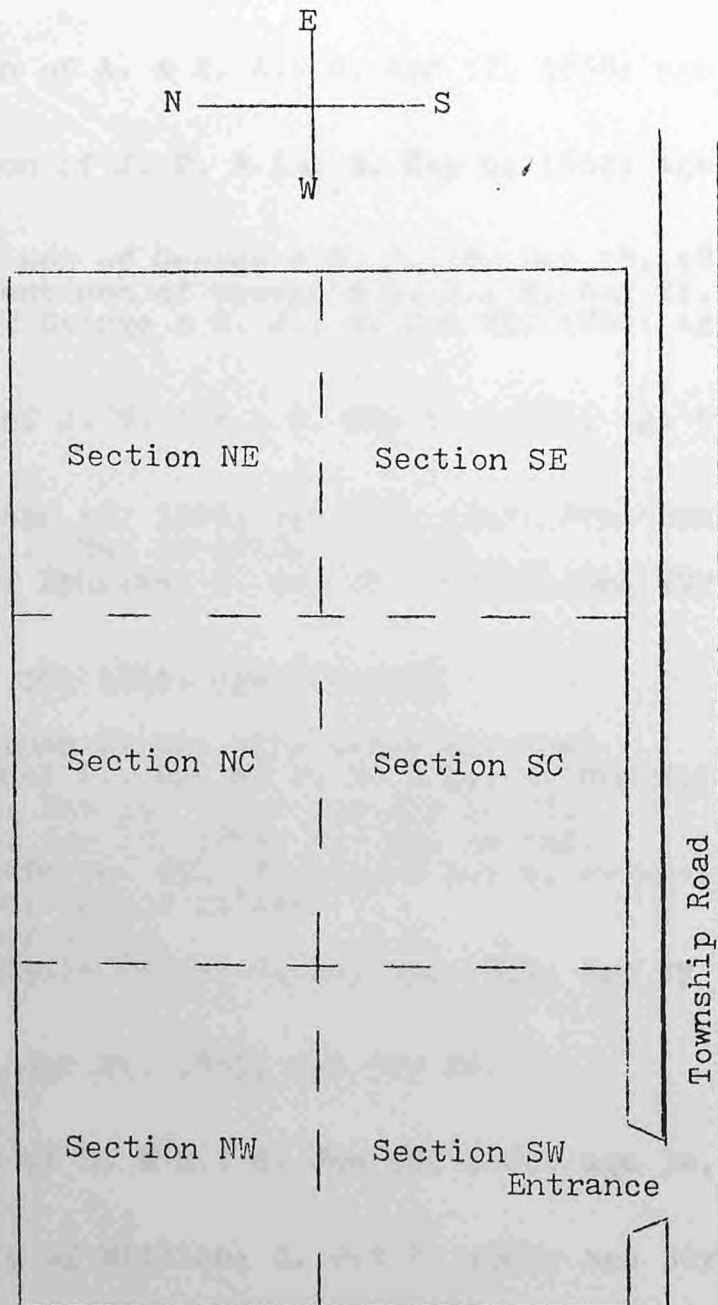

Genealogical Notes - Pearce Cemetery

ARTHURS: Abraham Arthurs was a son of Joseph and Elizabeth Zimmerman Arthurs, both natives of Pennsylvania. Abraham lived on the family farm until his marriage in 1846 to Margaret Ann Hageman, a native of Wayne County, Ohio. They had 6 children: Joseph, died in 1865; Jesse, married Harriet Atkinson and moved to Whiting, Kansas; Franklin married Lucinda Vertress; Mary J. married Jacob Angle and moved to Whiting, Kansas; Catherine Frances married Fillmore Mummert and lived on the family farm in Walnut Grove Township; Margaret Jeanette married William Thompson and moved to a farm near Rushville. Leah Jane, a sister of Abraham, died in 1864 at age 18. Another sister, Barbara, married Alexander Snapp of Walnut Grove Township -- see SNAPP. Abraham Arthurs enlisted in the army in Feb 1865 and served with Co "C", 151st Ill. Inf. until Feb 1866. He attained the rank of corporal and was discharged at Springfield, Illinois. The Arthurs family moved from Pennsylvania to Cass County, Illinois in about 1844 and in 1856, relocated to a farm in section 26, Walnut Grove Township. Joseph and Elizabeth Arthurs were among the original 36 members of the Centre Chapel which was organized in 1875.

BAILEY: Margaret J. Although the surname was partially unreadable, this is believed to be the grave of a daughter of William Washington and Elizabeth Walker Bailey who were married in Adair County, Kentucky in about 1819 and moved to McDonough County with other members of the Walker family in the early 1830's. William W. was born near Natural Bridge, Virginia on Nov 25, 1797 and was a son of William Schreve Bailey, a native of Virginia. The elder Bailey died in Adair County, Kentucky; William died in Macomb on Mar 22, 1872. He and Elizabeth had 10 children - 3 of those children died at an early age. Mrs. Bailey died in the Macomb area in Aug 1856. William operated a dry goods store in Macomb for several years. Elizabeth's father was James Walker, a former resident of Adair County, Kentucky.

BARNHARDT: Margaret; wife of David Barnhardt and daughter of Jonah and Anna Stoop Lindsay. (See WOLFE-SANDIDGE-LINDSAY)

BOOTH: George; born in County Tyrone, Ireland in 1796; died Sep 24, 1846. At the age of 27, Mr. Booth married Isabel Orr of County Tyrone, Ireland. The couple then emigrated to this country and lived in Philadelphia for 7 years where he was in

the woolen goods manufacturing business. They then moved to Trumbull County, Ohio and farmed there till moving to this county in 1843. The Booth's had 10 children, 3 dying in infancy. Other children were John W., George, Robert, Mary A., Sarah J., James O., and Thomas. George and Isabel Booth were among the original 17 members of the Macomb Christian Church which was organized on Sep 16, 1845.

Jane, wife of W. Booth and Thomas--Members of this family owned and operated farms in section 28, Walnut Grove Township. They moved here in 1844 from Trumbull County, Ohio. Thomas was born in Pennsylvania.

Sarah J. and Margaret D. Booth were children of Mr. & Mrs. James O. Booth.

James (d. 1888) and Nancy, his wife (d. 1880). James was born in Ireland and was a brother of George. In 1828, Mr. Booth moved to Philadelphia and was a weaver there until he lost his business in the financial crash of 1837. In 1846, he and his family moved to Macomb and in 1855 relocated to a farm in Walnut Grove Township. A son, James C., was born on Oct 16, 1839 in Ireland, while the family was visiting relatives there. He was the youngest of 6 children; he and another son, William, served in the army during the civil war. James C. married Sarah Elizabeth Cruse of Monroe County, Iowa in 1871; he died in 1908 and was buried in Hickory Grove Cemetery.

Varvra; Macomb Journal reported death of Barbara Booth of Walnut Grove Township in Jan 1877; age 99 years.

William Booth was a son of James and Nancy Booth. He was a civil war veteran, having served with Co "F", 55th Ill Inf from Oct 10, 1861 to Oct 31, 1864. Mr. Booth was born in Philadelphia.

BROADUS: Lucetta A. Walker Broadus; daughter of Joseph Gilmer and Susan Bell Walker. (See Walker.)

CAMPBELL: Alexander Campbell was born in Augusta County, Virginia and moved with his parents to Knox County, Tennessee at an early age. His grandfather was a native of Scotland. Alexander married at age 22 to Mary Strain, a native of Tennessee, and had 7 children while living in that State. The family started for Illinois in 1829 and stayed one winter in Christian County, Kentucky. During the Spring of 1830, they moved on to the Camp Creek area of Industry Township in this county. They lived at that location about six years and then moved to a farm on section 16, Walnut Grove Township. Mr. Campbell served as an elder of the Macomb Presbyterian Church and after moving to Walnut Grove Township, assisted in organizing the Shiloh Presbyterian Church in the area of his home. This was in 1839 and the Church's original body, which met at the Campbell home for several years thereafter, numbered 23. Mr. Campbell was also an original trustee of the McDonough College which was organized in the mid-1830's. He is also credited with the establish-

ment of the first Sunday School in the county, that being on Camp Creek; he was also Walnut Grove's first Justice of Peace, being appointed to that position in 1836. His 7 children, all born in Tennessee, were as follows: Jane L., who married Andrew Walker (see WALKER); Mahala A., who married Quintas Walker; John S., who moved to Chariton, Iowa; David, who was born in about 1820, farmed in this area, moved to Good Hope in 1869 and operated a mercantile store there for several years; W. S. D., who later moved to Warren County; Mary A.; and Margaret. The elder Mr. Campbell died of a fever which spread throughout this area in the mid-1840's. His daughter, Jane L. Walker, also died of that disease a few days after Alexander's death.

DECKER: Harrison Lincoln was a son of Mr. & Mrs. Stephen O. Decker who owned and farmed 160A on section 12, Macomb Township. Mr. Decker was born in Ohio and moved to this area from Licking County, Ohio in 1854. He was a veteran of the civil war and died in 1882. He was buried at Oakwood Cemetery in Macomb; block 3, lot 140.

DUDLEY: Infant twin sons of E. R. and E. A. Dudley. One died at birth on Feb 24, 1863; the other died at age 14d Mar 10, 1863.

DUNCAN: Harvey E. was a son of Robert and Emeline Pearce Duncan. Mrs. Duncan was a daughter of Jesse B. and Mary Ann Clark Pearce. The Duncans later moved to Arkansas where Emeline died.

EARLY: William Lewis Early was born in Gibson County, Indiana on Apr 21, 1831; the son of Lewis and Sarah Early. William lived in his native Indiana until age 16 years when he moved with his parents to this county and settled on section 35, Walnut Grove Township. The elder Early's died in 1862 and were both buried in this cemetery. On Jun 7, 1854, William married Catharine M. Walker, a daughter of Gilmer and Susan Bell Walker. Her father died in 1841 and her mother in 1843 in Macomb; both were buried in this cemetery (see WALKER). Mr. & Mrs. William Early had 11 children: Jessie B., Mary L., William G., Percy W., Ernest R., John S., James R., Joseph G., Pinkney A., Charles, and Sarah M. Mr. Early served as a trustee of the Jerusalem Chapel, United Brethren Church in Macomb Township. The Early family lived on and farmed 160A located in section 35, Walnut Grove Township. Their son, Joseph G., died on May 24, 1902 at age 27y 8m 12d. Cause of his death was tuberculosis.

Lewis and Sarah Finney Early; parents of William Lewis Early; moved from Gibson County, Indiana to Walnut Grove Township in 1844 and settled on section 35. Both Lewis and Sarah died in January 1862.

GILCHRIST: Charles Allen; 1834-1906. Government headstone reads: "Capt., Co "A", 10th Mo Inf." Charles Allen Gilchrist was the 2nd child of a family of 5 born to Charles A. and Minerva H.

GILCHRIST: Charles Allen.

Holton Gilchrist and was born in Windham County, Vermont. His father, a native of Walpole, New Hampshire, was born May 27, 1802 and married Minerva H. Holton in December 1829. The elder Gilchrist was a son of Samuel and Betsey Allen Gilchrist. Betsey was a niece of Col. Ethan Allen of Revolutionary War fame. Minerva Holton Gilchrist was a daughter of Joel Holton and was born in Windham County, Vermont. The Gilchrist family moved to McDonough County in 1839 and bought a farm in Tennessee Township. The elder Mr. Gilchrist served as postmaster at Hill's Grove for a number of years and was McDonough County surveyor from 1855-57. Minerva died in 1865 and her husband died in 1882, both dying in Tennessee Township where they had lived for several years. Charles Allen married Lucy Ellen Walker, a daughter of Joseph Gilmer Walker. They lived in the Carthage, Illinois area for awhile and Mr. Gilchrist enlisted in the army during the Civil War and served as a Captain with the 10th Mo Inf.

HAMILTON: Children of Perminium and Elizabeth A. Robinson Hamilton. Mr. and Mrs. Hamilton were the first couple to be married in Bushnell Township. Elizabeth was a daughter of Matthew B. Robinson, the first settler in Bushnell Township. The Robinson family lived on section 30. Perminium Hamilton enlisted in the army on Aug 14, 1862 and served with Co "I", 78th Ill Inf; he died of wounds on Oct 15, 1863. He was buried in Oakwood Cemetery in Macomb - lot 43, block 3.

HOGUE: Mary Ann, wife of John Hogue. (See SANDIDGE.)

HOWELL: James Stanford, son of John and Elizabeth Howell; died August 14, 1844.

KEIRNS: Martha, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. William Kierns. William entered the army in May 1864 and served with Co "I", 137th Ill Inf; discharged on Sep 24, 1864. He died on Jul 22, 1907 and was buried in Bushnell Cemetery, block 111, lot 2.

KEPPLE: William R., son of J. E. and E. A. Kepple and a nephew of Mary Ann Kepple Snapp. His full name was William Riley Kepple. David Kepple, an extensive land owner in this area and in Mound Township, owned the farm immediately east of the Pearce Cemetery for several years.

KNEHANS: Henry Knehans was born in Germany and moved to Walnut Grove Township in 1857 from Franklin County, Missouri. He owned a farm on section 29.

LEMON: David H. Lemon, son of Mr. & Mrs. David Lemon was born in Connecticut and later moved with his family to Adams County, Illinois. In 1865, surviving members of the family relocated to this county and David H. bought a farm in section 34, Walnut Grove Township. He was a Civil War veteran, having served with Co "K", 39th Ill Inf which was organized in Chicago during the early part of the conflict.

LINDSAY: Philena, daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Nathan Lindsay and sister of Samantha Lindsay Sandidge. Nathan was a son of Jonah and Anna Stoop Lindsay and grandson of Stephen and Rachel Randel Lindsay. His parents were married in Ohio on Feb 1, 1826 and moved to this area in about 1858. Nathan was the 4th eldest of a family of 6 children. His eldest sister, Rachel, married C. Andrews; Ellen married Shadrack Overbay and she died in 1858; Margaret married David Barnhardt and she died in this county in 1868; Stephen, who died in 1885; Serena married Edward Hunt. Nathan's mother died and his father married, in 1865, to Mrs. Mary Sandidge Clark, daughter of Daniel and Permelia Tate Sandidge. The second Mrs. Lindsay's first husband, Edward, had previously died. Jonah, Nathan's father, died Jan 29, 1873, at his home in Prairie City Township. (Philena headstone broken and parts are missing.)

MAGEE: Hester A. (see PEARCE.)

MC KEE: Hannah, wife of Aaron P. McKee. The former Hannah Hayhurst, a native of Miami County, Ohio and daughter of Benjamin and Hannah Hayhurst who farmed in Emmet Township. Mrs. McKee's mother and a sister, Margaret, died in 1873 and 1874, respectively, and were buried in Stickle Cemetery in Emmet Township. Aaron P. was born Jul 16, 1821 in Miami County, Ohio and later worked on steamboats on the lower Mississippi River, as a second mate. In about 1850, he moved to Indiana and on Apr 29, 1851, married Hannah Hayhurst. The couple then moved to this county. When Mrs. McKee died in 1862, she left 5 children: Daniel W; William H.; Charley A.; Frank P.; and Hannah I. A few months after the death of his first wife, Aaron P. McKee remarried; his second wife was Eliza Cromer, a niece of his first wife. Mr. McKee farmed in Emmet and Macomb Townships and was a director of the McDonough County Fair Association. He died on Sep 8, 1890, and was buried at Oakwood Cemetery in Macomb.

ORAHOOD: Eliza E. and Melissa were daughters of Jarret and Victoria Pearce Orahood. Mrs. Orahood was a daughter of Jesse B. Pearce. Mr. & Mrs. Orahood later moved to Madison County, Iowa.

PEARCE: Local histories as well as direct descendents of the Pearce family state that Jesse B. Pearce, who died in 1899, was also buried here; however, no stone or other marker was located during this survey. Jesse B. Pearce was born in Blount County, Tennessee on Nov 3, 1808; his parents were David and Sarah Bartlett Pearce; the elder Pearce was born in Virginia and Sarah was a native of Maryland. In 1811, the Pearce family moved to Madison County, Illinois and returned to Tennessee the same year. Jesse remained in that State until the winter of 1829-30, when he returned to Madison County, Illinois. During the Spring of 1830, he moved to Morgan County, Illinois and lived there for about 20 years. He moved to this county in the Spring of 1850 and bought the Hugh Ervin farm located on the NW $\frac{1}{4}$  of section 26, Walnut Grove Township. Mr. Pearce then built a 2-story brick

home on his farm; this was the first brick house to be built in the township. On Aug 14, 1831, in Cass County, Illinois Jesse married Mary Ann Clark, a daughter of William M. and Margaret Clark. They had 12 children: Emeline, married Robert Duncan, moved to Arkansas and died there; Ellen; Victoria, married Jarret Orrahood, moved to Iowa; Jackson, died at age 14 months; Hester A. married James Magee, died in this county in 1873; Sarah M., married Charles Cline, moved to Macomb; Lucinda J., married John Dixon, moved to Green County, Missouri; George C., married Addie Ingals, moved to Oskaloosa, Iowa; Florence; David F., married Lizzie Amos, moved to the Macomb area; Lulu Frances, died in this county; Ester Isabel. Mr. Pearce owned 320A in Walnut Grove Township and moved to Macomb Township in about 1885. His mother died in McMinnville County, Tennessee in 1858 at age 75; his father died at the same location on March 4, 1885 at age 102.

PENNELL: Jonathan, son of N. & N. Pennell. Other members of this family were buried at Hickory Grove Cemetery.

PITTINGER: Eugene R., son of Albert H. and Eugenia P. Sandidge Pittinger. Albert was born in Brook County, Virginia on Mar 25, 1830 and when he was 7 years old, he and his family moved to Fulton County, Illinois. They lived there about 2 years, then moved to Schuyler County where his parents died, his father in 1868 and his mother in 1865. Albert was the 6th child of a family of 10. He and Eugenia P. Sandidge were married in Rushville on Mar 6, 1856 and moved to this county in about 1875, settling on a farm in section 13, Walnut Grove Township. Mrs. Pittinger was a daughter of Daniel and Permelia Tate Sandidge and was born in Virginia. The Sandidge family moved to this county in the early 1840's and settled in Eldorado Township. (See WOLFE and SANDIDGE.)

PLOTTS: Joseph C. Mr. Plotts enlisted in the army on Aug 5, 1861 and listed Bushnell as his home address at that time. He served as a private in Co "D", 28th Ill Inf and was killed at Fort Holt, Kentucky on Nov 22, 1862. NOTE: A huge pine tree, located near this grave, has now grown around the entire base of this stone.

POLLACK: Robert Pollack was born in Dearborn County, Indiana on May 26, 1829 and was a son of David and Jane Lowry Pollack. His parents were natives of Ireland and moved to McDonough County in early 1834. His mother died shortly after arriving here in 1834 and his father, David, died shortly thereafter. At the death of his parents, the family was living near Macomb. After the death of his parents, Robert lived with relatives in Peoria and in Springfield, and at the age of 8 years, moved in with the Quintus Walker family. He remained with that family until his marriage to a daughter of Mr. Walker, Mary, on Mar 8, 1855. The Pollack's then moved onto their own nearby farm and lived at that location the remainder of their lives. They had 7 children: Quintus Alexander; William L.; Mahala J.; Robert L. These four children died in infancy. Melvin C. was born

POLLACK:

Apr 26, 1862; Elmer A., born Mar 1, 1868; Mary Elizabeth, born Jan 16, 1872. At the time of his death in 1900, Mr. Pollack owned a farm in section 16, Walnut Grove Township.

SANDIDGE: William W. Sandidge was born near Elizabethtown, Kentucky on Dec 13, 1839 and was a son of Joshua and Mary Hogue Sandidge. His paternal grandparents were John and Patience Sandidge, who lived in Lincoln County, Kentucky. His father, Joshua, was born in that county in 1812 and married Mary Hogue in 1834. She was a daughter of Andrew Hogue, a veteran of the Revolutionary War. Joshua Sandidge and his family moved to Illinois in the 1840's and located on a farm in Eldorado Township. William, the third eldest child in a family of seven, married Samantha Lindsay on Feb 20, 1862. She moved to this county with her parents in 1858. She was a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nathan Lindsay and granddaughter of Jonah and Anna Stoop Lindsay, who moved here in about 1858 from their native Ohio. (See LINDSAY). William and Samantha Sandidge had 4 children: Philena, Anna, George B., and Araminta. Philena and Araminta later became school teachers in this county. When William died at age 26 years in 1866, he was survived by his widow and 2 daughters. Samantha Lindsay Sandidge's father, Nathan, and Margaret Lindsay Barnhardt were brother and sister. (See Barnhardt.)

SNAPP: Elizabeth J. (d. 1866) and Infant daughter (d. 1866) were daughters of Alexander and Barbara Arthurs Snapp. Alexander was a son of John Henry and Mary Ann Kepple Snapp and was born in the State of Tennessee on Jan 26, 1834. He was the third child of a family of nine and this family moved to McDonough County in 1834, when Alexander was an infant. His mother, Mary Ann, died in this county in 1848 and his father then moved to Missouri in 1854 and died in Mercer County, Missouri in 1872. With the exception of about 3 years living in Missouri, Alexander was a life-long resident of McDonough County. William, a younger brother of Alexander, was killed during the Civil War while serving as a member of the 55th Ill Inf at Vicksburg, Mississippi. On Jan 1, 1856, Alexander married Barbara Arthurs, a daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth Zimmerman Arthurs, and a native of Blair County, Pennsylvania. In 1864, Snapp bought a farm on section 21, Walnut Grove Township and in the late 1800's owned nearly 300A in that area. He and his wife had 9 children: Elizabeth, who died at age 5 years in 1866; Clara, who died in infancy in 1866; James Nelson, also died in infancy; John Henry; Mary Ann, who married Moses Callahue and later lived in Sciota Township; Marion; Nora May; Clara Ellen; and Franklin. The Snapp family originally settled on the SW $\frac{1}{4}$  of section 30, Mound Township when they moved to this county in 1834. About 6 years later they moved to Macomb and lived in that area several years. Members of the Snapp family were among original members of Centre Chapel in Walnut Grove Township, organized in 1875. Mary Ann Kepple Snapp, who died in 1848 while living in the Macomb area, was a daughter of Jacob Kepple and was born in the

State of Tennessee. The Kepple's settled in this county about the same time as the Snapp's and farmed in the same section of Mound Township. Alexander and Barbara Snapp were both buried in Good Hope Cemetery, lot no. 132, which Mr. Snapp bought in April 1895.

SPICER: James H. Spicer was born in Delaware and married Priscilla Ralph in that State before moving to Illinois in 1835. They first settled in Quincy, but moved to Vermont, Illinois in about 1836. Two years later they relocated to Table Grove and in 1838, Mr. Spicer platted the town of Table Grove. In 1854, the family moved to a farm about 2½ miles west of Bushnell. A son of James and Priscilla, John B., married Sarah J. Medaris and farmed in the area of his parent's home a few years. He later moved to Bushnell and operated a drug store with his brother and retired in about 1883. John's wife, Sarah, was a native of Ohio. T. H. Spicer, another son of James and Priscilla, later moved to Good Hope; in 1907, he was a resident of that town and was a member of the McDonough County Old Settler's Association.

STARK: Chatharine, wife of W. D. Stark, died Oct 3, 1859; age 36y 5m 6d. William Stark of Walnut Grove, entered the army in Oct 1864 and served with Co "A", 12th Ill Inf until Jul 10, 1865.

WALKER: Joseph Gilmer Walker was the eldest child of Alexander and Magdaline Hammond Walker and was born in Virginia. Alexander was born near Natural Bridge, Virginia and was married in that State to Miss Hammond, a native of North Carolina, on March 22, 1790. The elder Walker's had 11 children: Joseph Gilmer, Cyrus, David, Abner, Cynthia, Margaret, Allen, Alexander, Jane, Andrew Hammond, Pinkney. Magdaline Hammond Walker died in 1811 in Kentucky. Alexander then married Margaret Frost Coumbes, who had previously been married. By that marriage, there were 3 children—Martha Magdaline, Thomas P., and Quintus. Alexander died Jul 25, 1824, in Adair County, Kentucky. In 1831, his widow and surviving children moved to Illinois and lived a few months near Clary's Grove in Sangamon County. They then moved to Industry Township in this county; then, in 1835, several members of the family moved on to Walnut Grove and Bushnell Townships. Joseph Gilmer Walker settled on section 34. He and Susan Bell were married in Kentucky and his children included Mary J.; Martha G.--Martha was the first death in the Township--; Lucetta A.; Flora, who was born in 1837 and was the first white child born in Walnut Grove Township, and who later married J. J. Scott; Catharine, who married William L. Early (see EARLY.); Louise, who married Ephraim Banning and later moved from this area; Lucy Ellen, who was born near Camp Creek in 1835 and later married Charles A. Gilchrist. (See Gilchrist.)

Quintas Walker was the eldest child of Alexander Walker and his second wife, Margaret Frost Coumbes-Walker. Quintas was born

in Adair County, Kentucky, about 3 miles south of Columbia in 1814. His father's first wife, Magdaline Hammond Walker, had died 3 years previously. Quintas was raised in Kentucky and moved to Illinois with his mother, brother, sister, step-brothers, and step-sisters in about 1831. They lived a short while in Sangamon County before moving to Industry Township in this County. Then, in 1836, Quintas and his step-brother, Joseph Gilmer, and his father-in-law, Alexander Campbell, moved to Walnut Grove Township; they became the first permanent residents of that area. The Walker brothers were the first to plant wheat in the township. Quintas and his wife, the former Mahala Campbell, were active in the Shiloh Presbyterian Church activities and Mr. Walker was an officer of that organization in 1878. Mr. and Mrs. Walker were married in Industry Township on Aug 4, 1830. A daughter, Mary, later married Robert Pollack. (See POLLACK.)

Andrew Hammond Walker was a son of Alexander and Magdaline Hammond Walker and was born in Virginia but lived several years in Adair County, Kentucky. His mother died in Kentucky in 1811 and his father died in 1824, also in Kentucky. Andrew moved to Illinois with other members of the family in about 1831. He settled in Walnut Grove Township in 1836 along with his father-in-law, Alexander Campbell, and his step-brother, Quintas Walker. On Mar 20, 1834, he married Jane Campbell, a daughter of Alexander and Mary Strain Campbell. They had 6 children: Margaret; Alexander C.; Joseph Gilmer; Isabella; Cynthia; and another who died in infancy. Jane Campbell Walker died during an epidemic on Oct 20, 1845; her father, Alexander, died three days earlier. On Jan 31, 1850, Andrew remarried; his second wife was Mrs. Mar. Hogshett Noel. She was a native of Virginia and was a daughter of James Hogshett, an early settler in Walnut Grove Township. He was born in Virginia in 1780, married there, moved to Highland County, Ohio where his wife died in 1830. Mr. Hogshett then moved to Fulton County, Illinois in 1833 and then to this county in 1837. He later returned to Fulton County and died near Ellisville on Mar 8, 1861. Andrew H. and Mary Walker had 6 children: William A.; Cyrus A.; Montgomery Allen; Martha J., Marion Alice; and Ellen M. The elder Mr. Walker taught school in this county for several years and was a veteran of the Mormon War. Of his 12 children by 2 marriages, 4 died at an early age; Margaret became the wife of a Mr. Michaels and moved out of Illinois; Alexander C. moved to Little River, Kansas; Joseph G. moved to Missouri and lived near Salisbury; Isabella married Mr. Scott and lived in Walnut Grove Township; Cynthia married Mr. Axtell and later moved to Kansas; William A. moved to Baileyville, Kansas; Cyrus A. and Montgomery Allen lived on the old family homestead in Walnut Grove Township. Andrew Hammond Walker died at 5 A.M. on Jan 6, 1885. NOTE: No stone for the first Mrs. Walker, the former Jane Campbell, was located and her burial site is uncertain; however, it is assumed that she was buried here in the Pearce Cemetery in view of the fact that her parents and several other members of her family were interred here. The name on the stone adjoining Andrew's is obscured; however, it is undoubtedly that of Mary, his second wife.

WALKER: Margaret was the second wife of Alexander Walker and moved to this county along with her children and step-children in 1831.

Marion A., Ella M., and Martha J. A. were daughters of Andrew Hammond and Mary Walker.

WOLFE: Charles W. was a son of E. T. and Permelia Clark Wolfe. Mrs. Wolfe was a daughter of Edward and Mary Sandidge Clark. Her father died and Mrs. Clark then married Jonah Kindsay, a widower. Mr. Lindsay died in 1873 and his widow then lived with her daughter, Mrs. Permelia Wolfe. E. T. was born in Indianapolis in 1847 and was a son of Jacob and Mary Jane Tyner Wolfe, also natives of Indiana. The family moved to Prairie City, Illinois when E. T. was an infant. They farmed in this area the remainder of their lives. He and Permelia Clark were married in 1872; she was a native of this State. E. T. farmed and raised livestock in the Bushnell/Walnut Grove area until about 1904, when he moved to the City of Bushnell. He owned about 320A on section 25, Bushnell Township. He and his wife had 5 children including Charles W.; Edward C. and William.

ZIMMERMAN: (See ARTHURS.)

McDonough County histories make note of the Pearce Cemetery and report that the first burial in this cemetery was that of Martha Walker; the second and third burials here were Frederick Dague and Mrs. Ephraim Banning, respectively. No stones or markers were located for the later two. Frederick Dague reportedly died in 1839. He moved here from Virginia and worked for Gilmer Walker. Mrs. Banning, the third burial here, was the former Mary Potter, a native of Virginia. Ephraim Banning moved to Walnut Grove Township in about 1836 and was unmarried; he worked in a saw mill for Abner Walker. Shortly after arriving here, he settled on a farm on section 34, returned to Virginia, and married Mary Potter. The couple then returned to Walnut Grove Township. They had 3 children and Mary Potter Banning died in about 1840. Mr. Banning then married Louise Walker, a daughter of Joseph Gilmer Walker and in 1855 the Banning's moved to Kansas. In 1861, Banning and his family moved to Brookfield, Missouri and Mr. Banning died there. His widow and surviving children then moved to the Chicago area.
